### Aid Framework: Unallocated Reserve 1989/90

1. Following consideration by the interdepartmental Joint Aid Policy Committee we have recently completed our annual look at next year's Unallocated Reserve.

2. After taking account of the repayment of past aid loans and of the estimating adjustment, after deducting all agreed allocations and after providing an in-year Contingency Reserve of £50 million, this year's PES settlement leaves us with a balance of £52 million to allocate in 1989/90.

3. We have also carefully scrutinised our existing programmes for potential savings in the light of the current information and forecasts about spending profiles. There are also additional commitments that are inescapable.

4. The latter are substantial, particularly on the multilateral side. Hence we face an increase of £13.6 million as a result of revised forecasts of EC budget aid expenditure to be attributed to the aid programme next ycar (£138 million in all); as well as £11.4 million for the World Bank GCI. Altogether we have identified inescapable commitments of £49 million, of which £15 million lie on the country programme side. These commitments are partially offset by savings of £16 million, including (most recently) £4 million on the Inter-American Fund for Special

/Operations



Operations, where we now expect drawings to be hit by the delays in the Seventh Replenishment of the Inter-American Development Bank. Thus we face a net addition of some £33 million on existing programmes in 1989/90 to set against the £52 million, reducing the sum available for allocation to £19 million.

My proposed allocations are set out in the Annex 5. to this minute. The £10 million to be added to the sub-Saharan Africa regional Programme Aid allocation speaks largely for itself. Support for economic reform in sub-Saharan Africa remains a key policy. We have also to provide from this source our contribution from existing resources (£10 million) to the Nigeria Even with the additional £10 million, initiative. the revised figure for sub-Saharan Africa programme aid next year (£114 million) remains well down on this year's allocation of £137 million. The remaining country programme allocations - almost all of which are for sub-Saharan Africa - will allow us some modest expansion of selected programmes we know to be particularly effective.

6. The allocations I have proposed are in accordance with those recommended by the Joint Aid Policy Committee. However, the scope for making the £<sup>1</sup> million saving on the Inter-American Fund did not come to light until later. I have decided that this saving should be used to increase the amount of aid we give through the NGOs under the Joint Funding Scheme (JFS). This scheme is an effective use of aid and attracts great political support here in the UK. This will bring the total for the JFS next year to £16 million.

NEW POLICY INITIATIVES: 1989/90 BILATERAL COUNTRY PROGRAMMES

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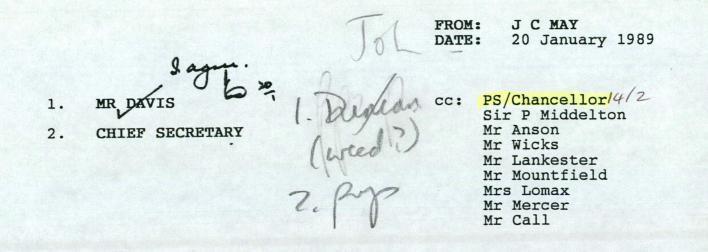

# AID FRAMEWORK: USE OF THE UNALLOCATED RESERVE FOR 1989-90

The Foreign Secretary's minute to the Chancellor of 12 January outlines his proposals for the use of the Unallocated Reserve in the Aid Framework for 1989-90 and for the £24 million addition to the overseas aid budget agreed in the Survey. These proposals have, save for those for non-governmental organisations, been agreed with Treasury and DTI at official level.

2. The Unallocated Reserve exercises takes place following the Survey and allows ODA to plan disbursements for the coming year from the monies available. It follows on from the earlier Aid Framework exercise which allocates then-existing funds for the three Survey years, on which the Chancellor commented on 23 August. The main Treasury interest in all this is:

a) to ensure that sufficient money remains unallocated and within ODA's 'contingency reserve', which is designed to meet unexpected pressures arising during the period from disasters, emergencies and other claims; we need to be satisfied these can be met from existing provision and without recourse to the Reserve;

b) to ensure that new policy commitments are catered for in plans.

3. The Foreign Secretary proposes a Contingency Reserve of £50 million for 1989-90; this sum has remained unchanged for the last three years. It represents just over 3 per cent of the gross

aid programme, a slightly smaller percentage than in earlier years given the increase in the size of the programme. However, having discussed this with ODA, we are content with the provision. ODA have 'flagged up' a number of potential claims which could arise over the year but these are no larger than those anticipated in earlier exercises. It is always difficult to predict what demands might arise unexpectedly during the year. Finally that judgement must rest with ODA, who have policy responsibility and are in the best position to take a view. They are aware that should more be required for such contingencies we would expect them to find the money from savings elsewhere within the aid programme.

The new allocations take account of savings - including a 4. small vfm improvement agreed in the Survey - and inescapable commitments. The two largest commitments are on the multilateral side, including almost £14 million more for EC aid attributed to this element now accounts for almost the aid programme: 10 per cent of the PES provision for aid and could, in time, provoke ODA to press for a change in its PES treatment. bilateral side include contributions to the Commitments on the Central African Federation pension fund agreed in the Survey. Of sum available for new initiatives (£19 million), almost all the goes to bilateral aid, primarily for sub-Saharan Africa, which accords with the thrust of aid policy.

5. You should note that an additional £10 million has been allocated for programme aid to sub-Saharan Africa: this will meet the ODA contribution, which you agreed with the Foreign Secretary, for aid to Nigeria in support of the proposed IMF programme. Expenditure is conditional on agreement between Nigeria, the IMF and other donors.

6. The additional £4 million to be spent on non-governmental organisations through the Joint Funding Scheme results from savings which have only recently come to light. Such expenditure is, however, in line with the current emphasis of aid policy and causes us no problems,

AID FRAMEWORK: USE OF UNALLOCATED RESERVE FOR 1989-90

Thank you for your minute of 12 January to Nigel Lawson.

2. My officials have discussed with yours the size of ODA's Contingency Reserve for next year and are content to accept their judgement on the adequacy of the £50 million proposed. I too am prepared to accept this, subject to offsetting savings being found from elsewhere in the aid programme should more be required for contingencies. I am also content with the other proposed allocations made.

TO

1. I enclose Aid Framework plans for the years 1990/91 - 1992/93. They are based upon the existing agreed PES base-line for aid and do not carry forward, for example, the additions agreed for spending this year to support Nigeria and to substitute for planned commercial borrowing by CDC.

2. Despite restrictive assumptions about the future level of EC aid spending in particular, the multilateral aid programmes continue to rise. As a result the overall bilateral country programme allocations are likely to fall in real terms over the next three years even after the use of the Unallocated Reserve. It has accordingly not been possible to plan to maintain our level of support for those countries already pursuing economic reform in sub-Saharan Africa and elsewhere; or to plan a response in regions where, through international efforts, peace is at last breaking out. I have in mind both Southern Africa, where aid has been a crucial part of positive measures policy and, in due course, South East Asia.

3. The ATP allocations include the additional amounts agreed in the last PES round to meet the anticipated costs of the existing Soft Loan Facility. Officials are currently reviewing the existing Soft Loan Facility and we shall need to consider their findings during our PES discussions in the autumn.

4. The Framework proposals have been drawn up in consultation with your officials. I am content with them. Over the coming months I shall of course be looking in more detail at the operation of the aid programme, both in the light of the current PES round and thereafter. But my general first impression is that we have a highly effective aid programme, and that within existing resources we are allocating funds where they can be expected to achieve sound results and further Britain's interests overseas.

5. I would welcome any comments that you and Nicholas Ridley, to whom I am copying this minute, may have before officials put the proposals into effect.
