

Lower PRIME MINISTER cc. Mr. Ingham Mr. Pattison Councillors' Remuneration Today's story in the Star, which was causing concern at the Media meeting, is completely wrong. It seems to be based on a false reading of the Robinson Report on Councillors' Remuneration, and the assumption - again false - that the Robinson Report has been accepted by Government. The Star story says that councillors will get -A salary of £20 a week; (i) (ii) Attendance allowances of £12.14; (iii) Subsistence expenses of up to £9.30; (iv) The right to claim financial loss allowance of up to £10.75; (v) Special responsibility payments. According to the Star, this would mean £4,000 a year, plus expenses, for the top men in the biggest local authorities. What Ministers have decided is rather different. They rejected the £20 a week salary proposed by Robinson, and have decided upon the following allowances: (i) The attendance allowance will be increased from £12.14 a day to £13.28; (ii) The arrangements for subsistence allowances will be changed so that in future councillors can claim these allowances for duties performed within three miles of their homes; (iii) Special responsibility allowances up to a maximum of £1.500 (though the Secretary of State for Scotland is still considering what the figure should be for Scotland); (iv) A new maximum of £14 for financial loss allowance - up from £12.40 at present. These new rates will be announced when the Local Government, Planning and Land Bill is published, probably next week. H Committee 19 November 1979



COUNCILLORS' REMUNERATION

You are familiar, I know, with the proposals for the remuneration of local councillors (H(79)40) which we discussed at MA Committee on 25 July.


The Committee felt strongly that it would be unwise to proceed with them. We should be accused of meanness by the local authorities, who criticised as inadequate even the more generous proposals of the Robinson Committee at the earnings levels of $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago. The new proposals would leave some councillors worse off than at present. On the other hand, we would attract a lot of criticism from the general public, increasing expenditure on councillors' remuneration, at a time of serious cuts in public expenditure, and in particular for paying an annual allowance which would be regarded as a salary.

The Minister for Local Government suggested an alternative approach. We should accept our predecessors' commitment to raise the attendance allowance to £13.28 in December, and, in addition, we should legislate to authorise special responsibility payments to no more than eight members carrying the heaviest burdens in each council. We invited him to develop these ideas in a further paper to be considered by the Committee in the autumn. Meanwhile, there will be no consultation with the local authority associations.

I am copying this minute to members of H Committee and the Minister for Local Government and Environmental Services, and to Sir John Hunt.

PRIME MINISTER

This paper contains Mr. Heseltine's proposals on councillors' remuneration. The last Administration did not exactly hurry to respond to the Robinson Report.

It may be argued that action is already overdue. And Mr. Heseltine's proposals are relatively modest, with an estimated cost of £3 million per annum above the cost of the present system. But the proposals would involve a significant change from an attendance allowance on a daily basis to a standard annual payment, with a lower attendance added subject to more rigorous conditions.

Mr. Heseltine wants to announce proposals to legislate, and to follow with quick consultations.

I wonder whether this is really an opportune time to be seen to be improving the terms of service of councillors. Of course timing will never be perfect, but you have yourself observed that the M.P.s' pay award was hardly appropriate at a time of cutbacks. Do you want me to pass any thoughts on this to the Home Secretary or to Mr. Heseltine before it is taken in H?
