

I have discussed his letter with the Chief Whip and we both feel that we must emphasise again the importance of not increasing the size of the programme - not just in terms of the total number of clauses to be enacted, but also in terms of the number of Bills, their complexity, and, above all, the extent to which they are likely to be opposed. As you know, concern was expressed in Cabinet about the number of Bills which will require to be guillotined in the House of Commons and we could well face a situation in which the Opposition will give us little or no co-operation in getting through even the less controversial parts of the programme. There are no grounds for optimism in their attitude so far, and it is more than ever important that the size of the programme should not be increased, and that it should be reduced if at all possible. The Chief Whip and I therefore welcome the Trade Secretary's agreement not to proceed with a second Companies Bill this Session. We accept that a short Civil Aviation Bill may be necessary to increase the borrowing limits of the British Airways Board and that of the British Airways Authority and we see the case for a short and, we hope, uncontroversial Bill for our Merchant Shipping Liner Conferences for introduction in the Lords. We hope that the latter will prove suitable /for Second Reading CONFIDENTIAL




for Second Reading Committee when it reaches the Commons and that the Trade Secretary will agree that it should be included in the programme on the same basis as the Bills listed in Annex D to your memorandum C(79) 17 - that is, it will be introduced only if it is accepted for Second Reading Committee.

We are, however, concerned at the possibility that the Civil Aviation Bill might be expanded into a substantial and controversial measure. I do not know how many of the possible extra provisions which the Trade Secretary indicates in the third paragraph of his letter are absolutely essential, but I am particularly concerned by the suggestion, which I understand he has put forward in more detail to the Ministerial Committee on Economic Strategy, Sub-Committee on Disposal of Public Assets (E(DL)), that the Bill should be used to bring British Airways within the framework of the Companies Act in order to provide legislative cover for a share issue. Even if this can be done with only a few extra clauses, the Bill would be completely transformed and the difficulties of handling it in Parliament would be enormously increased. The Chief Whip and I must therefore ask that if a provision of this kind is needed it should be deferred until later in the Parliament.

I am sending copies of this letter to the Prime Minister, to other members of QL and E(DL), and to Sir John Hunt.

LEGISLATIVE PROGRAMME 1979/80: TARGET DATES

Departments were invited, when submitting their proposals in May for the Legislative Programme 1979/80, to give an estimate of when they expected each Bill to be put forward for policy approval, when instructions could be sent to Counsel and when the Bill should be ready for introduction. These estimates were summarised in the Annex to the Home Secretary's memorandum C(79) 18.

- 2. The estimates have already proved useful in planning for the preparation and introduction of Bills, and we are grateful for the efforts departments are making to meet their target dates. It is clear, however, that the estimates are now in some respects out of date (for example, Parliamentary Counsel have not yet received instructions on several of the Bills which were expected to be ready for introduction this month) and departments will probably now be in a position to give a more accurate estimate of their Bills' likely progress. It would help in planning for the work which Parliamentary Counsel can expect to undertake during the long recess, in arranging the business of Cabinet Committees, and in preparing for Parliament's return in the autumn, if departments could now review their proposed timetables and up-date them where necessary.
- The review should cover all the Bills listed in the programme (ie the Annex to C(78) 18, read with CC(79) 6th Conclusions, Minute 6) apart from contingent Bills, and it should take account of any changes in the department's programme proposed or agreed subsequently. Departments are asked to ensure that their timetables are as realistic as possible, allowing for possible policy difficulties and providing sufficient time for Counsel to draft the Bill. It will be particularly important to keep to the timetable after the long recess because of the likelihood that a number of bills will need guillotine motions. We recognise the hazards in making any forecasts of this kind, but an over-optimistic estimate at this stage can result in wasted capacity and possibly to the unnecessary loss of a Bill from the programme. Where a significant change from the original timetable is proposed, it would be helpful to have a brief explanation.

It will normally be sufficient to make estimates to the nearest month, although more accurate estimates will be useful for Bills which it is intended to introduce in November and December, or for which the timetable is particularly tight.

- 5. I am copying this letter to the private secretaries to all departmental Ministers, Charlotte Egerton (Chancellor of the Duchy's Office), Mardo MacLean (Chief Whip's Office), Charles Cumming-Bruce (Lord President's Office) and Brian Shillito (First Parliamentary Counsel's Office).



Legislative Programme 1979/80: Target Dates





 - 5. Highways (Road Humps)


The short and long titles of these Bills are either immediately available or could be made so before 27 June.

BILLS SUITABLE FOR HANDING TO PRIVATE MEMBERS

- We have now completed an urgent trawl of Departments for Government Bills which might be suitable for handing to private members successful in the ballot.
- 2. At present there are no Bills which can be offered without reservation. As you will see from the attached list, however, there are seven Bills for which policy approval is being urgently sought and which it is hoped will be ready in time for an interested Member to have the long title before the last day of presentation. Mr Cranley Onslow has already expressed interest in the Bill on the registration of electors, but we are not aware of any other Member who might want to take up one of the other possible Bills listed.
- 3. John Lyon met Mr Morrison and Mr Cope on 13 June and gave them a very general indication of the areas in which these possible Bills might become available, but until policy approval has been secured it is not possible to give a Member any assurance of Government support or assistance.
- 4. The number of possible Bills is considerably fewer than normal, but there has, of course, been very little time in which to develop proposals and to consult Ministers, and priority has inevitably been given to securing the more central parts of the Government's programme. In the circumstances, therefore, I think this is as reasonable a list as we can expect, although even this may be further reduced if Ministers have doubts about any of the proposals. I shall, of course, let you know as soon as Ministers have made decisions about any of the Bills in the attached list.
- 5. I am copying this letter to Nick Sanders, John Stevens, Charles Cumming-Bruce and Henry Rowe.

BILLS SUITABLE FOR HANDING TO PRIVATE MEMBERS - 1979/80 SESSION.

1. DENTAL (DHSS)

A Bill to increase the number of members of the General Dental Council elected by dentists; to amend the arrangements for the registration and suspension of dentists; and to make provision for revising the arrangements for specialist education and training. Up to 25 clauses. Policy approval expected by 22 June.

REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS (HOME OFFICE)

A Bill to amend the law relating to the electoral registration of the spouses of Service personnel, and to give electoral registration officers the power to correct the register after it has been published. About 5 clauses. Policy approval expected by 15 June. Mr Cranley Onslow wishes to take up the Bill.

3. CORONERS (ABOLITION OF VIEW) (HOME OFFICE)

A Bill to abolish the requirement for the coroner to view the body as a prerequisite of assuming jurisdiction to hold an inquest. Recommended by the Committee on Death Certification and Coroners (the Broderick Committee). Less than 5 clauses. Policy approval expected by 18 June.

4. MATRIMONIAL HOMES (RIGHTS OF OCCUPATION) (LORD CHANCELLOR'S DEPARTMENT)

A Bill to improve and consolidate the existing law on the rights of spouses to occupy the matrimonial home. It would implement one of the Bills proposed by the Law Commission in their third report on family property of June 1978. Up to 5 clauses. Policy approval expected by 18 June.

5. COUNTRYSIDE (SCOTLAND) (SCOTTISH OFFICE)

A Bill to preserve rights of way and footpaths in Scotland by vesting responsibility in a single level of local government and conferring on planning authorities new powers to make bye-laws. About 5 clauses. Introduced by Lord Hughes last session. Policy approval expected by 25 June.

6. MARRIED WOMEN'S POLICIES OF ASSURANCE (AMENDMENT) (SCOTLAND) (SCOTTISH OFFICE)

A Bill to allow a married woman to effect a policy of assurance for the benefit of her husband or children and to enable any man or woman to effect such a policy for the benefit of a future spouse or child. The Bill would relax restrictions under existing Scottish law and bring it more into line with that in England and Wales. About 5 clauses. Policy approval expected by 25 June.

7. ROAD HUMPS (DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORT)

A Bill to empower local highway authorities to install road humps designed to control vehicle speeds, subject to regulations to be made by the Minister of Transport on the dimensions and location of the humps. Section 17 of the Road Traffic Act 1974 at present empowers the Minister of Transport, with the consent of the local highway authority, to install such humps on a public highway, but they must be removed within a year. Less than 5 clauses. Policy approval expected by 25 June.

A09762 PRIME MINISTER Legislative Programme 1979-80 (C(79) 17 and 18) BACKGROUND The Home Secretary in his paper (C(79) 17) on behalf of The Queen's Speeches and Future Legislation Committee, recommends the introduction of 43 main Bills (Annex A) and foresees the need for some "Contingent" Bills (say five out of a list of 16) (Annex B). In addition there could be ten Scottish Bills (Annex C); and up to nine lower priority Bills provided they are accepted for Second Reading Committee. A programme of fewer than 70 Bills (out of 102 originally submitted by Ministers) is not excessive in a long Session, but perhaps as many as 15 will be markedly controversial and probably six (not identified) will require to be guillotined. Details of the Bills are given in the separate paper C(79) 18. In selecting Bills, the Committee have sought a balanced programme reflecting the Government's main political objectives (paragraph 1 of C(79) 17). All The Queen's Speech Bills have found a place. Otherwise QL have been guided, with few exceptions, by the priorities of Departmental Ministers. Among the exceptions are the Road Safety (Drink and Driving) Bill which QL decided was not urgent and would most likely prove to be controversial, and the Rate Support Grant (Wales) Bill, which you asked to be rejected. One or two Ministers may seek to add to the Programme. In particular, the Secretary of State for Industry may press the claims of the Telecommunications Authority Bill, which would split the Post Office into two Corporations dealing with posts and telecommunications respectively. He will have an Aircraft and Shipbuilding (Denationalisation) Bill (No. 35) and an Industry Bill (No. 36), but probably not a separate Cable and Wireless Bill (No. 37) if provision can be made elsewhere. The Secretary of State for Trade, who will have five Bills (Nos. 12, 13, 14, 41 and 42) may seek one further Bill (e.g. Consumer Credit, Civil Aviation, Merchant Shipping (Liner Conferences)). -1-

- 4. The question of a single Bill for the Disposal of Assets is shortly to be considered in the Disposal of Public Assets Sub-Committee, E(DL). I do not know whether it would wholly supplant any of the Bills listed, though it could affect the four indicated by footnote 3 in Annex A.
- 1. QL have sought not to overburden Parliament with legislation, to avoid late sittings and shortened Recesses. The Leaders of the two Houses and the Whips are concerned about the possibilities of delay inherent in a controversial programme; by the fact that some Bills, notably Housing and Local Government, Planning and Land, are long and complicated; and doubts whether Bills needed for early introduction will be ready by November. This is the background to the points made in paragraphs 5 and 6 of C(79) 17 and in conclusion 7(e). You will wish to bear them in mind if additional Bills are put forward in Cabinet.

HANDLING

- 6. You might invite the <u>Home Secretary</u> to introduce his paper, and then see whether the <u>Lord Chancellor</u>, the <u>Leaders of the two Houses</u> or the <u>Chief Whip</u> wish to add anything on the feasibility of the programme.
- 7. In discussion, you will wish to see that the Cabinet are satisfied with the likely political impact of the programme and that it meets the Government's objectives.
- 8. It should not be necessary to go through the list of Bills, but you will want to give Ministers an opportunity to comment on particular items.



GOVERNMENT BILLS SUITABLE FOR OFFERING TO PRIVATE MEMBERS IN 1979/80 SESSION OF PARLIAMENT

I am writing to invite Departments to suggest suitable bills for offering to private Members who are successful in the ballot which will take place tomorrow, Thursday 24 May.

To be suitable for this purpose a bill should normally be short, simple, non-financial and largely uncontroversial. We have identified a very small number of bills from the bids I received from Departments last week as possible candidates for this procedure and these are listed in the attached Annex. I should be grateful to know from the responsible Department whether these bills can be offered to Private Members. It is also highly desirable that Departments should identify further possible private Members' bills so that the Whips can have a reasonable list to offer to Members. It may, for example, be possible to identify individual provisions which have been proposed as part of a Government miscellaneous provisions bill, but which could instead be taken through the House by a private Member. This would have the additional advantage of reducing the size of the Government bill.

I am afraid that there is not much time to draw up a list. As you know, collective policy clearance must be obtained before the title of the bill may be handed to a private Member and although the bill need not be drafted before the Member gives notice of presentation, the contents must be sufficiently clear to enable Parliamentary Counsel to draft the long title in time for the bill to be presented. The last day for presentation this Session is Wednesday 27 June. Departments with bills which could be offered to a private Member should therefore take urgent steps to secure policy clearance from the appropriate Committee and drafting authority from the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

Perhaps I could also remind you that negotiations with Members who are successful in the ballot - of whatever party - are the responsibility of the Whips' office. They will co-ordinate approaches to the various Members and requests from them; Departments should not contact individual Members

/themselves

Private Secretary to the Prime Minister (For Information) themselves. If Ministers are approached by a Member successful in the ballot, they are asked to let the Whips' office know as soon as possible. As soon as policy clearance for the bill has been obtained, Departments should send a short description of the Bill to the Whips' office.

Because the timetable is so tight, I must ask you to send me comments on the attached list and suggestions for additional bills by $5.00~\rm pm$ on Tuesday 12 June.

I am copying this letter to the Private Secretaries to all Departmental Ministers and to Charlotte Egerton, Murdo MacLean and Brian Shillito.



Reception among Welsh local authorities is likely to be mixed and is to some extent unpredicable, since the proposition has not been discussed with them outside the context of Devolution. - (a) Central Government: 13 additional 11. Public Expenditure and Manpower posts will be required in the relevant areas of the Welsh Office but the Department will balance these by offsetting savings. No identifiable addition to central government expenditure is envisaged. (b) Local government: a small but unquantifiable addition to local government manpower may be involved in manning the local government side of the annual negotiations. A separate system should lead to better control of local authorities' current expenditure in Wales, since it will involve separate control totals. - 2 -

LEGISLATIVE PROGRAMME 1979-80: BILLS FOR IMMEDIATE INTRODUCTION

Memorandum by the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster

- 1. I shall shortly be putting to the Committee a list of all the bids which have been proposed by colleagues for the Legislative Programme 1979-80. This will, however, take a little time and we ought to consider at once which bills should be introduced during the first few weeks of the new session. There are some matters on which legislation is in any event needed without delay, and we must provide a reasonable flow of legislative business from the beginning of the session.
- 2. I attach a summary of bills which our colleagues have suggested for introduction in the period up to about 15 June. I have divided them into:
 - (a) bills which <u>must</u> receive Royal Assent as soon as possible (essential bills);
 - (b) bills which might become essential quite quickly (contingent bills);
 - (c) other bills of varying importance and priority which could be introduced early (general bills), and
- (d) bills which might be suitable for Scottish Grand Committee.

 Within each category the bills are in alphabetical order of their sponsoring
 Department.
- 3. I should like to aim for an initial programme of about 10 bills, sufficient with the Debate on the Address and the Budget to provide worthwhile business in both Houses in the period up to the end of June. The first bills from our main programme should then be coming forward.

We must also

take account of the character of the first bills to make sure that they strike the right political note on which to begin the Parliament.

In view of their urgency \(\sqrt{I}\) have agreed with the Lord Chancellor that Legislation Committee should urgently consider the Kiribati Bill and the European Assembly (Salaries and Pensions) Bill in advance of our consideration and that, subject to our views and those of Legislation Committee, these bills should be introduced immediately. If it can be got ready in time, the Education Bill will also be taken early at Legislation Committee in view of its importance and the need for early action on comprehensive school plans.

of the other bills, I propose that we invite the Ministers responsible for the Bills on Companies, Off-shore Installations, Limitation, the Price Commission, Criminal Justice (Scotland) (Amendment) and Law Reform (Miscellaneous Pensions) (Scotland) to press ahead for urgent policy agreement and to have their bills drafted as soon as possible, so that they can be introduced in the appropriate House at the earliest opportunity. The other measures proposed seem to me to be strong candidates for immediate introduction early in the session

But this is not to prejudge the question of whether they ought to find a place in our full legislative programme for the session which we shall be considering at a later meeting.

6. I invite my colleagues to agree on the bills which ought to be made ready for immediate introduction at the beginning of the session.

I understand, however, following discussions between officials in our Education Department and the Department of Education and Science, that the first of the two DES Bills proposed for this Session will be purely concerned with the repeal of the compulsory comprehensive provisions of the 1976 Education Act and will not, as we initially thought, include other matters. Mr Edwards is, therefore, content that powers to pay specific grant towards the cost of bilingual education in Wales should not be included in the first Bill. This measure is, however, of considerable importance to education in Wales and my Secretary of State is of the view that it is essential that it should be included in the second of the Education Bills.

Mr Edwards will also wish to seek an early opportunity to announce his intention.



LEGISLATIVE PROGRAMME 1979-80

- 1. I am writing to ask for your Minister's proposals for legislation in the 1979-80 session of Parliament.
- The legislative programme will be prepared on the assumption that the session will continue until the summer of 1980. As a first and immediate step, however, we need to identify quickly those Bills which must be introduced at the beginning of the session because early enactment is needed to meet a particular deadline, and to identify those Bills which could be made ready for early introduction during the period when there may not be much other business before the House. I should be grateful, therefore to receive a list of Bills which must or could be introduced during the period up to 15 June, summarised as in the pro forma at Annex A and with 4 copies of the pro forma at Annex B completed for each Bill as described in Annex C. In order to prepare the Parliamentary programme for the first weeks of the session I must ask you to let me have these details by 5.00 pm on Thursday 10 May.
- It will be necessary also to prepare urgently a full programme of Bills which might be considered for introduction in the course of this session as a whole. It will need to include all those Bills for which Royal Assent will be required before the end of July 1980. I should be grateful if you could send me a full list of your Minister's proposals as in the pro forma at Annex A by 5.00 pm on Friday 18 May. The list should include any Bills which you may previously have submitted as candidates for immediate introduction; for the remainder we shall need four copies of the separate descriptions of each Bill as in the pro forma at Annex B.

An accurate forecast of the number of clauses and schedules will not be possible, but some indication such as "very short" (not more than 3-4 clauses), "short" (up to, say, a dozen clauses), "medium" (12-25 clauses), "substantial" (25-50 clauses), or "long" (over 50 clauses) would be useful.

4. PURPOSE OF BILL

5. PROPOSED CATEGORY

The categories for proposed Bills are -

Please give, with reasons, the date by which Royal Assent is needed for Essential and Contingent Bills, and where appropriate, target dates for the enactment of Bills in other categories.

9. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE
