

Vile's minute of 10 August to Mr. Pattison here) No 10 has written to the Private Secretaries of newly appointed members of the Government, referring those Ministers to paragraph 119 of "Questions and Procedure", which deals with the publication of memoirs. We sent Ministers a copy of the Radcliffe Report, a summary of its conclusions and recommendations, and a declaration form. The form was returned here, and then forwarded to your office. We agreed that it would be considerably simpler if you were to take responsibility for these procedures. At present you send a round robin letter to Departments following Ministerial changes reminding them of the basic Ministerial procedures for new appointees or those leaving office. Sir Robert also writes to all newly appointed Ministers (including Whips). The Radcliffe declaration point might be covered in Sir Robert's letter or by yours (so long as yours was amended to cover both Whips' offices) or by a separate letter under your signature. But this of course is a matter for you. I attach for information copies of the standard letter we have been using for this purpose, of the summary and conclusions of the Report, and of the declaration form. I also attach the copies of the Radcliffe Report itself which you passed me earlier today.

#### Ministerial Changes

Following the appointment of [Mr X] as [Secretary of State for Y] there are a number of matters arising from changes in Ministerial appointments to which I should draw your attention.

#### Papers

When Ministers leave or change office, the practice is for them to leave for the use of their successors the copies of any memoranda or minutes of the Cabinet or its Committees that were issued to them. Papers which are no longer in current use should be destroyed. I should be grateful, therefore, if you would:

- (a) confirm that [Mr X] has taken over the Cabinet and Cabinet Committee documents needed for current administration;
- (b) confirm that [his] predecessor has not taken away any Cabinet or Cabinet Committee papers.

I should also be grateful if you would arrange for the disposal of any Cabinet or Cabinet Committee documents no longer required for current use. May I remind you that the destruction of all SECRET and TOP SECRET documents should be supervised by two individuals, both of who sign a destruction certificate.

#### Ministerial Memoirs

Ministers leaving the Government should also be reminded of the recommendations of the Radcliffe Report on Ministerial Memoirs. For this purpose, I enclose a copy of the Report for you to pass to [Mr L].

CONFIDENTIAL Questions of Procedure for Ministers On first appointment to the Government, the Secretary of the Cabinet writes to all new Ministers enclosing a copy of "Questions of Procedure for Ministers" and drawing their attention to the guidance it contains. Some of this advice may assume particular relevance if a Minister subsequently assumes a new appointment or responsibilities, particularly in relation to potential conflicts (whether real or apparent) between private interests and new Ministerial responsibilities (Section IX). I would draw your attention particularly to the paragraphs in this section relating to membership of Lloyd's (paragraphs 74 and 77). Parliamentary Private Secretaries I should also remind you of procedures for the appointments of Parliamentary Private Secretaries in case your Ministers wishes to appoint a new Parliamentary Private Secretary. The Chief Whip should be consulted about all such appointments and, in view of the special position which Parliamentary Private Secretaries occupy in relation to the Government, the approval of the Prime Minister should also be sought before any such appointment is offered and announced. It is not necessary to seek the Prime Minister's approval when a Minister wishes to reappoint a Parliamentary Private Secretary on a change of office but No 10 should be informed of such appointments. I would also draw your attention to guidance concerning Parliamentary Private Secretaries in Questions of Procedure for Ministers (paragraphs 37-40). Copies of this letter go to Private Secretaries to [all Cabinet Ministers and Ministers of State]. A copy also goes for information to Nigel Wicks at No 10. REPORT OF THE CONDITTED OF PRIVY COUNCILLORS ON MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS: (The Radcliffe Report - Cmnd. 6386 of January 1976) SUPPLARY OF CONCLUSIONS AND RECONTENDATIONS The conventions currently governing the publication by former kinisters of memoirs and other works relating to their experience as Ministers were laid down in a statement made in the House of Commons on 1 August 1946 on behalf of the Prime Einister (Er Attlee) by the Lord President of the Council (Er Herbert Morrison). This was based on a memorandur by the Secretary of the Cabinet, Sir Edward Bridges, which Mr Attlee's Cabinet had approved. (Paragraphs 13, 14, 41, 42). 2. The conventions established in 1946 have been maintained under successive Administrations and the Committee do not recommend modification of the principles then advocated. They do however draw out of the conventions certain specific working rules: and make recommendations as to the administrative structure thich should condition the clearance of an ex-Minister's intended memoirs. The conventions are to be regarded as concessions made to the author, rather than as restrictions imposed on him. (Paragraphs 19, 38, 43). 3. The author should be free to use his Ministerial experience for the purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three separate categories of information: 1. He must not reveal anything that contravenes the requirements of national security operative at the time of his proposed publication. 2. He must not make disclosures injurious to this country's relations with other nations. 3. He must refrain from publishing information destructive of the confidential relationships on which our system of government is based. In particular -In dealing with the experience that he has acquired by virtue of his official position, he should not reveal the opinions or attitudes of colleagues as to the Government business with which they have been concerned. That belongs to their stewardshir, not to his. He may, on the other hand, describe end account for his own.

- b. He should not reveal the advice given to him by individuals whose duty it has been to tender him their advice or opinions in confidence. If he wishes to mention the burden or weight of such advice, it must be done without attributing individual attitudes to identifiable persons. Again, he will need to exercise a continuing discretion in any references that he makes to communications received by him in confidence from outside members of the public.
- c. He should not make public assessments or criticisms, favourable or unfavourable, of those who have served under him or those whose competence or suitability for particular posts he has had to measure as part of his official duties.

He may, however, regard the obligations concerned with confidential relationships (but not those concerned with national security and international relations) as lifted after the expiry of 15 years from the relevant events, though even beyond that point he should not reveal the advice tendered by individuals who are still members of the public services nor make public assessments or criticisms of them.

(Paragraphs 45-57, 83, 85, 86).

- 4. These restrictions leave him a wide latitude for the writing of an account of his stewardship. (Paragraph 87).
- 5. The established principles of lew do not provide a system which can protect and enforce those rules of reticance that the Committee regard as called for when ex-Ministers compose their memoirs of Ministerial life. (Paragraph 65).
- 6. Nor does legislation offer the right solution. (Paragraph 69).
- 7. There can be no guarantee that, if the burden of compliance is left to rest on the free acceptance of an obligation of honour, there will never be an occasional rebel or an occasional breach; but so long as there

remains a general recognition of the practical nacessity of some rules and the importance of observing them, the Committee do not think that such transgressions, even though made the subject of sensational publicity, should be taken as having shattered the fabric of a sensible system.

(Paragraph 69).

- 8. A Minister on taking and loaving office should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs. (Paragraphs 71, 72).
- 9. A former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his Ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cobinet.

  (Paragraphs 73-77).
- 10. The Secretary of the Cabinet, acting at the request of the Prine Minister and on his behalf, should have duties of two kinds in relation to such a namuscript. (Paragraphs 77, 78).
  - 1. To have it examined in respect of national security and the preservation of international relations and to transmit any objections to the author. The author should have a right of reference to the Prime Minister but should accept the latter's decision as final.

    (Paragraph 79).
  - 2. To offer views on the treatment of confidential relationships in the manuscript. The author should pay careful attention to this advice but must take upon his own shoulders the responsibility for deciding what he is going to say. If he decides to publish material in spite of advice from the Secretary of the Cabinet, he should let the Secretary know what he proposes to do so that before publication there may be time for the Prime Kinister to bring his own direct influence to bear upon the dispute, if he wishes to do so. (Paragraph 80).

- 11. A former Einister who has kept a diary of his Einisterial experience should give tostamentary instructions to ensure that its publication does not flout the current understandings that his own ex-colleagues are likely to be observing. (Paragraph 99).
- 12. Former members of the public services should be under the same obligation as former Ministers to submit their manuscripts for scrutiny with regard to national security and international relations, and to defer to the judgement of those carrying the immediate responsibilities in those fields. In the natter of confidential relationships, the principles which the Committee enunciate concerning publications by ex-Ministers, the obligations which they suggest should rest upon them, and the periods for which those obligations should be maintained, should all be reflected also in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and other works relating to their official experience by former members of the public services. (Paragraphs 92, 93).

### MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS

Mr. Arthur Bottomley asked the Prime Minister whether he has yet received the Report of the Radelific Committee on Ministerial Memoins; and whether he will make a statement.

The Prime Minister: The Report of the Committee of Privy Counsellors on Ministerial Memoirs, under the chairmanship of Lord Radcliffe, which was submitted to me at the end of December 1975, is being published today as Cmnd 6386. I should like so express to Lord Radcliffe and his colleagues my appreciation of the careful and thorough study they have made and of the distinguished report which has emerged from it.

The Report makes comprehensive recommendations as to the rules and procedures which should govern the publication by former. Ministers of memoirs relating to their period of office. The recommendations are firmly based on the present conventions as they have developed over the years, which the Committee argue should properly be regarded as concessions made to the author rather than as restrictions imposed upon him.

The Committee recommends that an author should be free to use his ministerial experience for the purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three categories of information. The first two consist of information relating to national security and to this country's relations with other countries. In these areas, the Committee considers that information must be withheld from publication for however long may be necessary and that authors must be prepared to accept as final the judgment of the current Prime Minister as to what material it would be harmful to publish.

The third category consists of information destructive of the confidential relationships upon which our system of government is based. It includes information about the opinions or attitudes of colleagues regarding any Government business; advice tendered to Ministers in confidence by individual officials; and personnel matters.

The Committee recommends that authors should regard themselves as precluded from publishing information in these categories for a period of 15 years after the relevant events, or, in the case of advice by individual officials or comments upon their capabilities, until the persons concerned have completed their official careers if that is the longer period.

It would of course be open to former Ministers to publish memoirs at any time providing that they did not contain information falling within any of the three categories identified in the Report.

As regards enforcement of the proposed rules, the Committee does not consider that satisfactory machinery is provided by the law as it now stands. It does not recommend the enactment of legislation establishing a series of new offences, and instead recommends that compliance should be allowed to rest on the free acceptance by the individuals concerned of an obligation of bonour. It proposes, however, that a Minister, on taking and leaving office, should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs; and that, as now, a former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cabinet who, acting on behalf of the Prime Minister, should ascertain whether it conformed to the proposed rules.

The Committee also recommends that the principles it has enunciated concerning publications by ex-Ministers should be reflected in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and similar works by former members of the public services.

The Government, having considered the Report, have decided to accept the Committee's recommendations in full. They trust that they will also command general acceptance and observance. They agree that a voluntary code of conduct is preferable to new legislation on this matter, although, as the Committee noted, the sanctions of the Official Secrets Act or any legislation which may supersede it, and, in an exceptional case, of the civil law, will continue to be available. I shall be arranging for all present Ministers to be informed of the new arrangements and, as recommended in the Report, shall invite them to sign an appropriate declaration







REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF PRIVY COUNCILLORS ON MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS: (The Radcliffe Report - Cmnd. 6386 of January 1976) SUMMARY OF CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS The conventions currently governing the publication by former Ministers of memoirs and other works relating to their experience as Ministers were laid down in a statement made in the House of Commons on 1 August 1946 on behalf of the Prime Minister (Mr Attlee) by the Lord President of the Council (Mr Herbert Morrison). This was based on a memorandum by the Sacretary of the Cabinet, Sir Edward Bridges, which Mr Attlee's Cabinet had approved. (Paragraphs 13, 14, 41, 42). The conventions established in 1946 have been maintained under successive Administrations and the Committee do not recommend modification of the principles then advocated. They do however draw out of the conventions certain specific working rules: and make recommendations as to the administrative structure which should condition the clearance of an ex-Minister's intended memoirs. The conventions are to be regarded as concessions made to the author, rather than as restrictions imposed on him. (Paragraphs 19, 38, 43). The author should be free to use his Ministerial experience for the 3. purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three separate categories of information: He must not reveal anything that contravenes the requirements of national security operative at the time of his proposed publication. He must not make disclosures injurious to this country's relations with other nations. He must refrain from publishing information destructive of the confidential relationships on which our system of government is based. In particular -In dealing with the experience that he has acquired by virtue of his official position, he should not reveal the opinions or attitudes of colleagues as to the Government business with which they have been concerned. That belongs to their stewardship, not to his. He may, on the other hand, describe and account for his own.

b. He should not reveal the advice given to him by individuals whose duty it has been to tender him their advice or opinions in confidence. If he wishes to mention the burden or weight of such advice, it must be done without attributing individual attitudes to identifiable persons. Again, he will need to exercise a continuing discretion in any references that he makes to communications received by him in confidence from outside members of the public.

c. He should not make public assessments or criticisms, favourable or unfavourable, of those who have served under him or those whose competence or suitability for particular posts he has had to measure as part of his official duties.

He may, however, regard the obligations concerned with confidential relationships (but not those concerned with national security and international relations) as lifted after the expiry of 15 years from the relevant events, though even beyond that point he should not reveal the advice tendered by individuals who are still members of the public services nor make public assessments or criticisms of them.

(Paragraphs 45-57, 83, 85, 86).

- 4. These restrictions leave him a-wide latitude for the writing of an account of his stewardship. (Paragraph 87).
- 5. The established principles of lew do not provide a system which can protect and enforce those rules of reticence that the Committee regard as called for when ex-Ministers compose their memoirs of Ministerial life. (Paragraph 65).
- 6. Nor does legislation offer the right solution. (Paragraph 69).
- 7. There can be no guarantee that, if the burden of compliance is left to rest on the free acceptance of an obligation of honour, there will never be an occasional rebel or an occasional breach; but so long as there

remains a general recognition of the practical necessity of some rules and the importance of observing them, the Committee do not think that such transgressions, even though made the subject of sensational publicity, should be taken as having shattered the fabric of a sensible system.

(Paragraph 69).

- 8. A Minister on taking and leaving office should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs. (Paragraphs 71, 72)
- 9. A former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his Ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cabinet. (Paragraphs 73-77).
- 10. The Secretary of the Cabinet, acting at the request of the Prine Minister and on his behalf, should have duties of two kinds in relation to such a manuscript. (Paragraphs 77, 78).
  - 1. To have it examined in respect of national security and the preservation of international relations and to transmit any objections to the author. The author should have a right of reference to the Prime Minister but should accept the latter's decision as final.

    (Paragraph 79).
  - 2. To offer views on the treatment of confidential relationships in the manuscript. The author should pay careful attention to this advice but must take upon his own shoulders the responsibility for deciding what he is going to say. If he decides to publish material in spite of advice from the Secretary of the Cabinet, he should let the Secretary know what he proposes to do so that before publication there may be time for the Prime Minister to bring his own direct influence to bear upon the dispute, if he wishes to do so. (Paragraph 80).

- 11. A former Minister who has kept a diary of his Ministerial experience should give testamentary instructions to ensure that its publication does not flout the current understandings that his own ex-colleagues are likely to be observing. (Paragraph 99).
- 12. Former members of the public services should be under the same obligation as former Ministers to submit their manuscripts for scrutiny with regard to national security and international relations, and to defer to the judgement of those carrying the immediate responsibilities in these fields. In the matter of confidential relationships, the principles which the Committee enunciate concerning publications by ex-Ministers, the obligations which they suggest should rest upon them, and the periods for which those obligations should be maintained, should all be reflected also in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and other works relating to their official experience by former members of the public services. (Paragraphs 92, 93).

#### MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS (RADCLIFFE REPORT)

Mr. Arthur Bottomley asked the Prime Minister whether he has yet received the Report of the Radcliffe Committee on Ministerial Memoirs; and whether he will make a statement.

The Prime Minister: T. Report of the Committee of Privy Counsellors on Ministerial Memoirs, under the chairmanship of Lord Radcliffe, which was submitted to me at the end of December 1975, is being published today as Cmnd. 6386. I should like to express to Lord Radcliffe and his colleagues my appreciation of the careful and thorough study they have made and of the distinguished report which has emerged from it.

The Report makes comprehensive recommendations as to the rules and procedures which should govern the publication by former Ministers of memoirs relating to their period of office. The recommendations are firmly based on the present conventions as they have developed over the years, which the Committee argue should properly be regarded as concessions made to the author rather than as restrictions imposed upon him.

The Committee recommends that an author should be free to use his ministerial experience for the purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three categories of information. The first two consist of information relating to national security and to this country's relations with other countries. In these areas, the Committee considers that information must be withheld from publication for however long may be necessary and that authors must be prepared to accept as final the judgment of the current Prime Minister as to what material it would be harmful to publish.

The third category consists of information destructive of the confidential relationships upon which our system of government is based. It includes information about the opinions or attitudes of colleagues regarding any Government business; advice tendered to Ministers in confidence by individual officials; and personnel matters.

The Communee recommends that authors should regard themselves as precluded from publishing information in these categories for a period of 15 years after the relevant events, or, in the case of advice by individual officials or comments upon their capabilities, until the persons concerned have completed their official careers if that is the longer period.


It would of course be open to former Ministers to publish memoirs at any time providing that they did not contain information falling within any of the three categories identified in the Report.

As regards enforcement of the proposed rules, the Committee does not consider that satisfactory machinery is provided by the law as it now stands. It does not recommend the enactment of legislation establishing a series of new offences. and instead recommends that compliance should be allowed to rest on the free acceptance by the individuals concerned of an obligation of honour. It proposes, however, that a Minister, on taking and leaving office, should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs; and that, as now, a former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cabinet who, acting on. behalf of the Prime Minister, should ascertain whether it conformed to the proposed rules.

The Committee also recommends that the principles it has enunciated concerning publications by ex-Ministers should be reflected in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and similar works by former members of the public services.

The Government, having considered the Report, have decided to accept the Committee's recommendations in full. They trust that they will also command general acceptance and observance. They agree that a voluntary code of conduct is preferable to new legislation on this matter, although, as the Committee noted, the sanctions of the Official Secrets Act or any legislation which may supersede it. and, in an exceptional case, of the civil law, will continue to be available. I shall be arranging for all present Ministers to be informed of the new arrangements and, as recommended in the Report, shall invite them to sign an appropriate declaration





I also enclose a form of declaration for your Minister to sign. I would be grateful if you would arrange for your Minister to sign the declaration, which should then be returned to me.

This letter goes to the Private Secretaries of all Ministers.

My attention has been drawn to the Report of the Committee of Privy Counsellors on Ministerial Memoirs (Cmnd. 6386 of January 1976), of which I have been provided with a copy.

I understand that the publication by former Ministers of memoirs and the furnishing in other ways of an account of their Ministerial experiences are governed by the principles set out in the Report, and I note the need for former Ministers who wish to make public an account bearing on their Ministerial life to let the Secretary of the Cabinet see in advance the full text of what they propose to say.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF PRIVY COUNCILLORS ON MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS: (The Radcliffe Report - Cmnd. 6386 of January 1976) SUMMARY OF CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS The conventions currently governing the publication by former Ministers of memoirs and other works relating to their experience as Ministers were laid down in a statement made in the House of Commons on 1 August 1946 on behalf of the Prime Minister (Mr Attlee) by the Lord President of the Council (Mr Herbert Morrison). This was based on a memorandum by the Secretary of the Cabinet, Sir Edward Bridges, which Mr Attlee's Cabinet had approved. (Paragraphs 13, 14, 41, 42). The conventions established in 1946 have been maintained under successive Administrations and the Committee do not recommend modification of the principles then advocated. They do however draw out of the conventions certain specific working rules: and make recommendations as to the administrative structure which should condition the clearance of an ex-Minister's intended memoirs. The conventions are to be regarded as concessions made to the author, rather than as restrictions imposed on him. (Paragraphs 19, 38, 43). The author should be free to use his Ministerial experience for the purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three separate categories of information: 1. He must not reveal anything that contravenes the requirements of national security operative at the time of his proposed publication. He must not make disclosures injurious to this country's relations with other nations. He must refrain from publishing information destructive of the confidential relationships on which our system of government is based. In particular -In dealing with the experience that he has acquired by virtue of his official position, he should not reveal the opinions or attitudes of colleagues as to the Government business with which they have been concerned. That belongs to their stewardship, not to his. He may, on the other hand, describe and account for his omm.

b. He should not reveal the advice given to him by individuals whose duty it has been to tender him their advice or opinions in confidence. If he wishes to mention the burden or weight of such advice, it must be done without attributing individual attitudes to identifiable persons. Again, he will need to exercise a continuing discretion in any references that he makes to communications received by him in confidence from outside members of the public.

c. He should not make public assessments or criticisms, favourable or unfavourable, of those who have served under him or those whose competence or suitability for particular posts he has had to measure as part of his official duties.

He may, however, regard the obligations concerned with confidential relationships (but not those concerned with national security and international relations) as lifted after the expiry of 15 years from the relevant events, though even beyond that point he should not reveal the advice tendered by individuals who are still members of the public services nor make public assessments or criticisms of them.

(Paragraphs 45-57, 83, 85, 86).

- 4. These restrictions leave him a-wide latitude for the writing of an account of his stewardship. (Paragraph 87).
- 5. The established principles of law do not provide a system which can protect and enforce those rules of reticence that the Committee regard as called for when ex-Ministers compose their memoirs of Ministerial life. (Paragraph 65).
- 6. Nor does legislation offer the right solution. (Paragraph 69).
- 7. There can be no guarantee that, if the burden of compliance is left to rest on the free acceptance of an obligation of honour, there will never be an occasional rebel or an occasional breach; but so long as there

remains a general recognition of the practical nacessity of some rules and the importance of observing them, the Committee do not think that such transgressions, even though made the subject of sensational publicity, should be taken as having shattered the fabric of a sensible system.

(Paragraph 69).

- 8. A Minister on taking and leaving office should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs. (Paragraphs 71, 72).
- 9. A former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his Ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cabinet.

  (Paragraphs 73-77).
- 10. The Secretary of the Cabinet, acting at the request of the Prime Minister and on his behalf, should have duties of two kinds in relation to such a manuscript. (Paragraphs 77, 78).
  - 1. To have it examined in respect of national security and the preservation of international relations and to transmit any objections to the author. The author should have a right of reference to the Prime Minister but should accept the latter's decision as final.

    (Paragraph 79).
  - 2. To offer views on the treatment of confidential relationships in the manuscript. The author should pay careful attention to this advice but must take upon his own shoulders the responsibility for deciding what he is going to say. If he decides to publish material in spite of advice from the Secretary of the Cabinet, he should let the Secretary know what he proposes to do so that before publication there may be time for the Prime Minister to bring his own direct influence to bear upon the dispute, if he wishes to do so. (Paragraph 80).

- 11. A former Minister who has kept a diary of his Ministerial experience should give testamentary instructions to ensure that its publication does not flout the current understandings that his own ex-colleagues are likely to be observing. (Paragraph 99).
- 12. Former members of the public services should be under the same obligation as former Ministers to submit their manuscripts for scrutiny with regard to national security and international relations, and to defer to the judgement of those carrying the immediate responsibilities in these fields. In the natter of confidential relationships, the principles which the Committee enunciate concerning publications by ex-Ministers, the obligations which they suggest should rest upon them, and the periods for which those obligations should be maintained, should all be reflected also in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and other works relating to their official experience by former members of the public services. (Paragraphs 92, 93).

## MINISTERIAL MEMOIRS (RADCLIFFE REPORT)

Mr. Arthur Bottomley asked the Prime Minister whether he has yet received the Report of the Radcliffe Committee on Ministerial Memoirs; and whether he will make a statement.

The Prime Minister: The Report of the Committee of Privy Counsellors on Ministerial Memoirs, under the chairmanship of Lord Radcliffe, which was submitted to me at the end of December 1975, is being published today as Cmnd. 6386. I should like to express to Lord Radcliffe and his colleagues my appreciation of the careful and thorough study they have made and of the distinguished report which has emerged from it.

The Report makes comprehensive recommendations as to the rules and procedures which should govern the publication by former Ministers of memoirs relating to their period of office. The recommendations are firmly based on the present conventions as they have developed over the years, which the Committee argue should properly be regarded as concessions made to the author rather than as restrictions imposed upon him.

The Committee recommends that an author should be free to use his ministerial experience for the purpose of giving an account of his own work, subject to restrictions on three categories of information. The first two consist of information relating to national security and to this country's relations with other countries. In these areas, the Committee considers that information must be withheld from publication for however long may be necessary and that authors must be prepared to accept as final the judgment of the current Prime Minister as to what material it would be harmful to publish.

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
The Committee recommends that authors should regard themselves as precluded from publishing information in these categories for a period of 15 years after the relevant events, or, in the case of advice by individual officials or comments upon their capabilities, until the persons concerned have completed their official careers if that is the longer period.

It would of course be open to former Ministers to publish memoirs at any time providing that they did not contain information falling within any of the three categories identified in the Report.

As regards enforcement of the proposed rules, the Committee does not consider that satisfactory machinery is provided by the law as it now stands. It does not recommend the enactment of legislation establishing a series of new offences, and instead recommends that compliance should be allowed to rest on the free acceptance by the individuals concerned of an obligation of honour. It proposes, however, that a Minister, on taking and leaving office, should have his attention drawn explicitly to his obligations in relation to memoirs; and that, as now, a former Minister proposing to publish a work relating to his ministerial experience should submit the manuscript to the Secretary of the Cabinet who, acting on behalf of the Prime Minister, should ascertain whether it conformed to the proposed rules.

The Committee also recommends that the principles it has enunciated concerning publications by ex-Ministers should be reflected in the rules governing the publication of memoirs and similar works by former members of the public services.

The Government, having considered the Report, have decided to accept the Com-mittee's recommendations in full. They trust that they will also command general acceptance and observance. They agree that a voluntary code of conduct is preferable to new legislation on this matter, although, as the Committee noted, the sanctions of the Official Secrets Act or any legislation which may supersede it, and, in an exceptional case, of the civil law, will continue to be available. I shall be arranging for all present Ministers to be informed of the new arrangements and, as recommended in the Report, shall invite them to sign an appropriate declaration



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
